Dear Ms Brines:

Thank you for your attention to our petition requesting the addition of Ethiopian Pepper (*Xylopia aethiopica*) to section 205.606 of the National Organic Program's (NOP) National List of Allowed and Prohibited Substances (National List).

In response to your questions:

- 1) The Ethiopian peppers grow in the lowland rainforests in the savanna zones of West Africa. Because of the unique environment in which this wild-crafted plant lives, it is not something that lends itself to cultivation by organic growers. It is a plant that is by nature "de facto organic." We have contacted farmers about growing this in such a way that it could be certified. However, the growing conditions necessary combined with the small volume of use make it impossible to find a commercial grower for this substance.
- 2) The Ethiopian peppers provide a unique flavor profile to our African hot pepper sauces. There are no other plants which have the same taste which is an essential part of our brand identity.
